PC James Harvey 964 (City) walked from Duke St down Church Passage, yet not entering Mitre Square at approx 1.40AM. He got his time from the Post Office clock. He neither saw nor heard anything.

PC Edward Watkins 881 (City), patrolled Mitre Square as part of his beat from 10PM. He was instructed that night tow work 'left handed' - meaning that his patrol should proceed from the opposite direction to that which it would normal take. Watkins

would have noted that the gas lamp outside Kearly & Tonge's larger warehouse (Western side of Mitre Sq) was not working properly. At 1.45Am Watkins discovered the body.

George James **Morris** (former Met police officer) was night watchman at Kearley & Tonge warehouse in Mitre Square. He heard nothing out of the ordinary that night. At 1.45Am Morris was sweeping steps inside when PC Edward Watkins alerted him of the murder. Morris claimed to

have been in the warehouse continuously from 11PM and 1AM the following morning. Morris also said the following in a newspaper interview: ""Do you always take a look out into the square?" "Every night in the week, barring Saturday night, I stand at this door and smoke my pipe from one till two o'clock. It is a habit with me, and the police on the beat know it well, but on Saturday nights I have some work to do inside that interferes with it." "Did you see anything lying about that indicated what sort of man the murderer might be?" "I saw the doctor pick up two studs out of the pool of blood and put them in the shell." "But are there any signs of a struggle having taken place?" "No, but the studs might have been
